


Hi,

Nottingham born Nobel Prize winner to speak at our Sustainability Event



We are very pleased to announce that a Nottingham born Nobel prize winner

will be talking at our next Sustainability event. Henry and Sam have done a great job getting speakers from the US so that we can compare the UK and US perspectives on actions being taken to mitigate the effect of climate change. Although Professor Stanley Whittingham now lives in the US he was born in Nottingham and was awarded the 2019 Chemistry prize for for his work in developing lithium-ion batteries.


Greta Thunberg statue. The bronze statue is believed to be the world's first life sized sculpture of the Swedish climate change activist.
